- ⇒ They work as part of a team in designing their own opening ceremony including 'Spirit of the Games' oaths for the competitors, officials and coaches.
- ⇒ Pupils then design their very own Olympic Event and task card including roles for officials, coaches and participants. They later teach their event to the rest of the class.
- ⇒ Throughout this day pupils will learn and develop their understanding of the 'Spirit of the School Games' and the Olympic and Paralympic Values through a fun and inspiring day!
- ⇒ This day is offered to all schools in the Tameside School Sport Partnership (FREE to schools in the enhanced membership package, £250 to schools in the core membership package).

Alex Williams—A Tribute...

Alex Williams was and still is an inspiration. He was a leader, a role model and friend to many who will not yet believe that this special person has gone. He had overcome many barriers yet packed so much into his short life. His strength kept many people going, including his family and not many people will know that he was in pain a lot of the time- he never once showed it. He didn't want the Meningitis he contracted when he was 7 to ruin his life and would find other ways of doing things. Nothing was a barrier to him. Alex loved sport and wanted to make sure that he carried that on, even if he had to get into his wheelchair and join in that way. Through school he attended Active8 sessions- a scheme aiming to promote inclusion and talent in school competition.

Hawthorns National School Sports Week!




Hawthorns Community

School Kite Mark Update...









As mentioned in previous newsletters the Youth Sport Trust has introduced the new Kite Marking system in order to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and into the community. There are a number of pre-requisites that schools have to meet in order to be eligible to apply for Kitemark at any level. Some of these pre-requisites include being registered for the School Games and registered on the GetSet Network, a dedicated notice board and evidence of a commitment and promotion of the School Games values. There are 3 levels of the kite marking bronze, silver and gold which awards can be gained for two years. So far Hurst Knoll Primary School, Aldwyn Primary School, Dowson Primary School, St John Fisher RC Primary School and Flowery Field Primary School have received a bronze status with Holden Clough Community Primary School, Holy Trinity CE Primary School, Arlies Primary School, Our Lady of Mount Carmel RC Primary School, The Heys Primary School, Greswell Primary, Audenshaw Primary School, Pinfold Primary School, St Mary's RC Primary School and Astley Sports College, all receiving Silver status!
